Back in September I was faced suddenly, rather dramatically, and unexpectedly - especially to me - with the realization that it was time to step away from the organ bench. Without hesitation Bill agreed to fill the gap. (Actually, it was a plot on my part so I could sit with the congregation to enjoy his playing.)

One of our former pastors, Jack Wright, once said that he told the other ministers in our area that he had the best church organist. He also noted that when Bill poured it on there was no danger of cobwebs forming on the ceiling.

The Pastor's Pen

Offspring

*The proverbs of Solomon: A wise son brings joy to his father, but a foolish son brings grief to his mother.

Proverbs 10:1-4 KJV

It doesn't seem that long ago that I left home. I didn't much note that my departure, as the last of seven children, put my parents into the category of what we now call "empty nesters." Quite a few social and economic upheavals separate the 1980s from today, and still, this year some will become empty nesters as so many have before. I now have a much deeper appreciation for the emotional shift my parents were required to make. But unlike my parents' generation, when children left and did not expect to return, now we are experiencing the "boomerang generation." The shortage of positions that fit educational qualifications, the impossibility of affordable housing - whether because of mortgages becoming harder to obtain or the high cost of rent - means we have a growing population of young adults returning to live at home with their parents. In previous generations a sure declaration that a girl had become a woman was that she set up her own home.

The presumptions regarding when a person becomes a fully-fledged adult have become increasingly vague over the last decade. When does a boy become a man? Economically, today's young adults are having to take their place in the world in truly unorthodox ways. Good parents certainly set out to rear their children to be independent, hoping in the process to pass on some wisdom, and to enable them to lead good and fruitful lives. But surely today that wisdom must have to do with higher virtues much more than it does with the tactics of getting ahead. The world has changed just that much. We don't understand this new-fangled economy, but we do know the value of character.

And that's what lies at the heart of humanity's relationship with God as the Christian faith understands it. God loves each one of us as a mother loves a child. God's commitment to us is unconditional - God simply wants what's best for each one of us. To make that possible, God gives us Fatherly guidance and the freedom to do with it as we choose. Wouldn't life have been easier had God simply created us as puppets? I wonder, but I'm not for a moment interested in giving away God's gift of freedom.

The granting of freedom isn't an easy option. There's always an element of risk, and for a parent there may also be an element of loss. But it's the only way to see our children fully-fledged, and that's our mature decision as much as it is theirs.

In you, O God, every family on earth receives its name. Illumine the homes of this earth with the light of your love, granting courage to those who are hurt or lonely, endurance to those who care for sick family members, and wisdom to those in fearful times of change. We thank you for gifts of love we have received from mother, father, spouse, child, or companion. As we have been loved by you and by others, so may we love. Grant us your peace, through Jesus the Christ. Amen.

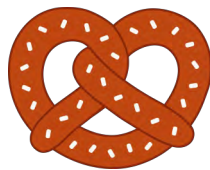


Summer Communion Schedule

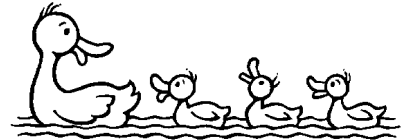
