Love First: Living With a Hospitable Heart

"Beauty is not in our perfection. It is in our recognition of our imperfection. It is in us believing who God says we are and not what the world says we should be."



"What would Jesus do?" The answer was always LOVE first.

God wants us to have a heart for hospitality - to be a person that chooses to make space for others and even more, to welcome them with love, even and especially when it's inconvenient. Hospitality is less about having the perfect setting to make people feel at home, but rather about becoming a safe place for others - to be a person with their heart set on helping others understand how much God loves them.

I came across the term "holy interruptions". It stuck with me because we have interruptions all the time. Sometimes we look at them as an annoyance or a distraction from the important things, but many of times they are actually an opportunity to do the most important things - to be who God calls us to be - light-bearers and messengers of His love.

In 2020, your door may not swing open quite as often, and your dining table isn't quite as full every evening, but try to hold your heart open - cling to the principles God wants us to practice:

Love first.

Become a safe place for others.

Make a conscious choice to approach people with a heart and mind set on letting them know Someone out there loves them.

Become so expectant of a holy interruption that you make margin for it. God will help you prioritize what is most important.

Remember that your time, talent and treasure aren't yours to keep. You have been blessed to become a blessing.

These, and so many more, are pieces that make up a hospitable heart. We aren't going to live it out perfectly. But if it helps, just remember that with every phone call, every texted prayer, every time we pull our neighbor's trashcan out of the street back to their house, every backyard or driveway conversation from evening until it's dark, every Saturday morning video chat, and every other moment we make a choice to love first, we're actually saying, "I love you," back to a Father whose very presence has whispered the same to our hearts since time began.

"Look for the Manna"

Then all the Israelites left Elim. They reached the western Sinai desert, between Elim and Mount Sinai, on the 15th day of the second month after leaving Egypt.

Then the whole community of Israelites began complaining again. They complained to Moses and Aaron in the desert. They said, "It would have been better if the Lord had just killed us in the land of Egypt. At least there we had plenty to eat. We had all the food we needed. But now you have brought us out here into this desert to make us all die from hunger."

Then the Lord said to Moses, "I will cause food to fall from the sky. This food will be for you to eat. Every day the people should go out and gather the food they need that day. I will do this to see if they will do what I tell them. Every day the people will gather only enough food for one day. But on Friday, when the people prepare their food, they will see that they have enough food for two days."

So Moses and Aaron said to the Israelites, "Tonight you will see the power of the Lord. You will know that he is the one who brought you out of Egypt. You have been complaining about the Lord, and he heard you. So tomorrow morning you will see the Glory of the Lord. You have been complaining and complaining about us. Maybe now we can have a little rest."

Who doesn't remember this passage! We laugh about the grumbling Israelites. But now we find ourselves smack in the middle of a pandemic that has cleared our usually full churches and sent us "wandering" aimlessly in a kind of wilderness place, wondering when this is ever going to end and when we can go back to "Egypt!"

True, in Egypt things weren't perfect. But we want to go back to what we were used to! We want to be in the church building, holding worship the way we were used to having it. We want our singers and our fellowship and our meals and our friends and our world as we knew it. Something has happened, and now nothing is ever going to be the same!

This is the voice of grief. The Israelites knew they were slaves to the life they had before. They knew things needed to change. But when change actually happened, they longed for what they knew. This is a very human response.

And what happens when people grieve? They get ornery. They get angry. They get nostalgic. They get sad. They complain. They will do anything to feel better. To feel the way they used to. This is life in the "wilderness." And for the Israelites, it went on for 40 years! 40 years it took until they were ready to accept their new life and enter into the promised land. Even then, it took the new generation to do it.

Sound familiar? It should.

The pandemic has shaken us to the core in so many ways. And we are trying to get a grip on our bearings. Whether or not it was a good thing (not), the church was our trusty source of stability, a place where nothing ever changed. And in a world of change, that felt good. Now, church has changed. Our rug has been removed. And we are afraid.

But as with the Israelites, we need to remember that God is still there. That Egypt wasn't the be all and end all of the story...and that great things are still to come...because the true stability is God. And God goes with you everywhere you are, even in the wilderness.

Sometimes, when we are hungry for what was it's very hard to find the manna amidst the sand. But there IS manna. Everyday, God is giving us hope through the gestures of people, through the new innovative thinking of people, through signs of love amidst the tumultuous culture we live in, through signs of life amidst the resounding and publicized deaths from a disease we don't trust or understand, and for some, refuse to even believe.

It's easier to be an ostrich than an eagle.

But the truth is, the Israelites can only choose to move forward. They cannot go back to Egypt. And as much as they long for life as they once knew it, that life for them has ended. They need to look for the manna to get through the wilderness and know that the promise land is coming. They must have faith in God that this time will end, and a new time will come that will be better than ever before.

Faith is sometimes an elusive deep-rooted trust in a God we cannot see.

It's hard to feel rootless. But you are only rootless if your heart was more in Egypt than in God. For God is your true stability. That's the voice of Moses.

We must stop looking back and start looking forward. For the past will never come back. At least not the way we knew it. And that's very hard to accept.

We can either wait around for 40 years waiting for the past to return. Or we can pick up our backpacks and go forward and discover new life emerging from the desert.

Think of it this way. Suppose you are married to someone who breaks the commitment and bond of the relationship by cheating on you with someone else. You are mourning the loss of the relationship as you knew it. You are angry and sad. You want your life back. You want things back the way they were. You want the "thing" to never have happened, the thing that disturbed your status quo. Now here's the thing. Suppose you and your spouse forgive, and you get back together. You will still never have the same relationship you had. It will never be the same. And thank goodness. Because you are now not the same people. You've grown and changed. He or she's grown and changed. Your relationship has grown and changed, so that you can get back together in a new way. You can never go back to what you were or what you had, but you've forged a new relationship going forward.

This is the way of the church too. This "thing" called COVID came into our lives and disrupted church as we knew it. It forced us to worship in new ways and in unfamiliar ways.

Some of us are angry right now. Some of us are sad. Some of us are saying right now, well, I'm just going to wait it out, and then things will go back to the way they were.

Except, they won't.

Some of us are trying hard to create the same experience as we had.

Except, you can't.

Some of us find it hard to find the manna in the middle of what looks like a lot of grey. And Egypt looks so awfully good right now, if only we could get back there! But we can't. We all know in our hearts that church will never be the same again. But that doesn't have to be bad news. In fact, it can be very good news. For churches were getting stagnant, immovable, and they were declining.

COVID has disrupted old patterns, old ways of thinking, old habits, and everything we knew. But Christians always knew someday we would need to leave our old behind if we ever had a chance of the church living on into a new future. God is sending you manna right now, if only you will look for it. And God is promising that if you move forward into new places and new thinking, a promised land is coming.

It's okay to grieve. It's natural to mourn what you've lost and what was familiar. But listen to the story of Moses. Now it's time to look for the manna, the signs of God's promise all around you. For what we do know from history is this: God will always have a church. The question is, will you be part of it?

What will church look like as we move forward? We don't entirely know. But we can create it together. And it can be the best and most meaningful adventure that you have ever taken!

God is here. God has never left. But as Jesus told his disciples many years ago, you can't keep God in a box, or in a tabernacle, or even in your conception of church. God is so much bigger than that.

Look for the manna!

Extra! Extra! Read All About It!

Dear Quakertown UMC Friends & Family,

The Bishop has just posted new guidelines for our conference accepting Governor Wolf's recommendations for our churches. For us, this allows us to expand our allowable in-person worship number from 25 to between 50 and 60 at our 11 AM service. The Bishop's guidelines can be found here https://www.epaumc.org/news-information/2020/11/re-opening-best-practices-for-churches-now-during-covid/

That said, with COVID-19 numbers rising at an alarming rate, I encourage you to judge wisely. Anyone 65 or older can continue to attend either the 9 AM Parking Lot Service or the 11 AM Livestream, both of which are safe options. Note that those attending 11 AM should continue to sit in a scattered manner. No one should sit in a pew directly behind others and masks must be worn at all times.

Should you feel ill, please do not attend worship. If anyone tests positive for COVID-19, notify the Pastor immediately and quarantine until you are considered safe. If an outbreak occurs, we will shut down live worship for the season.

To date, only about seven (7) people have been attending 11 AM worship, so the new guidelines will not change much for our congregation. However for anyone interested in our acceptable maximum capacity, the new guidelines give the church the freedom of in-person worship without fearing the 25 capacity ceiling. This will also allow more latitude for the 7 PM Thanksgiving Eve and 7 PM Christmas Eve services.

I commend those who have been following our guidelines with a humble, joyful, and peaceful spirit. You have been cooperative and no one has refused to wear a mask or has placed anyone in danger. Thank you for your care of each other.

Let us continue that love and care through this winter season. Numbers are rising quickly and Bucks County cases are on the upswing. Continue to use your best judgment. If what is allowable for the church is not in your best interest, choose a worship option that is right for you.

For those concerned about potential greater numbers in the sanctuary, I suggest you consider attending 9 AM Parking Lot worship, which will continue throughout the holiday season. So crank up your car heaters and give this beautiful, very Methodist outdoor worship experience a try. This service will be canceled on Sundays of heavy rain or snow. For those who are comfortable Livestreaming at home, I hope you will continue to enjoy that service.

Let us venture forward together. But the keyword is together, praising God who has kept our worship and people safe, along with many others.



Stewardship Campaign: The Stewardship Campaign for the 2021 QUMC fiscal year has begun. Members have received a 2021 Commitment Card and have been asked to prayerfully consider how they will support God's work through our church. Please return your 2021 Commitment Card as soon as possible as this information is needed to complete the 2021 QUMC Budget. Thank you.

Options for Worship: Now that there are more opportunities to worship "in person", please take advantage of one that fits into your personal safety and faith.

Don't forget to continue to give generously as our budget is straining and giving is down. You may mail in your offerings, give online, or bring them along when you attend worship.

Continued Appeal Regarding Bequest Opportunities: Bequests from individuals are an important part of the funding of our church's missions. If or when you plan a charitable bequest to help support the mission of the Quakertown United Methodist Church, you can direct your bequest it the following ways:

- 1. Unrestricted bequest: This is a gift for our general purposes, to be used at the discretion of our Trustees and Finance Committees. A gift like this without conditions attached is frequently the most useful, as it allows us to determine the wisest and most pressing need for the funds at the time of receipt.
- 2. Restricted bequest: This type of gift allows you to specify how the funds are to be used. Perhaps you have a special purpose or project in mind. If so, it's best to consult us when you make your will to be certain that your intent can be carried out.
- 3. Honorary or Memorial bequest: This is a gift given "in honor of" or "in memory of" someone. We are pleased to honor your request and have many ways to grant appropriate recognition.
- 4. Endowed bequest: This bequest allows you to restrict the principal of your gift, requiring us to hold the funds permanently and use only the investment income they generate. Creating an endowment in manner means that your gift can continue giving indefinitely.
